Lynda Shewchuk is the director of the concert band programs of Lakeshore New Horizons. She graduated from the University of Western Ontario with a bachelor of music and a bachelor of education. Lynda has several years of teaching experience in high school music as well as many years as a private music teacher of flute, clarinet, saxophone, piano, theory and history. Lynda directs flute ensembles, Wildwind Flute Choir and Toot Sweet. She also coaches the flute section for La Jeunesse Youth Orchestra.

Lynda played flute and piccolo in the Oshawa Symphony for about twenty-five years. She also played flute, clarinet and sax in the pit orchestra for approximately fifteen musical with Oshawa Little Theatre. She is a founding member of the Bach Porch Trio, a group that performs frequently at weddings, banquets and other special events. She is also a member of the Clarington Concert Band.

Elliott Tremeer

Elliott Tremeer is a graduate of Peterborough Teachers' College and holds a Fine Arts Degree from York University. During a twenty year teaching career he has taught all grades from grades 6 to 13. Elliott instrumental music taught Bowmanville High School for 16 years. After 20 years in the classroom he left teaching to pursue his second passion which was woodworking. He started building fireplaces mantles for a newly opened fireplace store in Oshawa, "The Fire, Brass & Patio House". He soon purchased this business and spent the next 20 years selling and installing gas fireplaces. He served as an officer in the Ontario Regiment (Army Reserves) as Director of Music for the regimental band and cadet band.

During that time he took courses at the Canadian Armed Forces School of Music in Esquimalt, B.C. and Camp Borden, ON. One of the highlights in that time was spending a summer in Whitehorse, Yukon, running a band course for cadets. Most of these kids were Innuit and had never played an instrument before but by the end of six weeks the band could perform in public. He played for many years with the Kawartha Kavaliers Drum Corps in Lindsay. involvement with Horizons started in fall of 2009. Elliott and his wife, Joan have lived in Bowmanville since 1971. Their two children Todd and Michelle are married and live in the Bowmanville/Courtice area.

From Our Music Director - Lynda Shewchuk

The first session of our new group, The Lakeshore New Horizons, has been going very well. Both the Monday and Wednesday bands have grown since last year. The Monday band is now 35 members and the Wednesday band is 34. (up from 20 last year) I feel that both bands are very well balanced. We have extra flutes and clarinets in both. The Wednesday band has 10 clarinets! It's wonderful to have baritone sax and baritone horns in both bands. We also have an expanded percussion section in both bands.

I enjoy having the beginners rehearse at the same time downstairs. This has worked very well. We are co-ordinating our breaks so that the members of these two groups can mingle and get to know each other. We have also had a 50/50 draw on the go that all three groups can participate in.

And Looking Back

In the 1840's in France, Adolphus Sax developed a family of Brass instruments with newly developed valves that started a music revolution. Small Bands of these instruments could perform any musical form popular in the day. This development started a growth industry in Europe that quickly spread to North America: The Town Band.

In Durham Region by the end of the 1850's every village had a town band or a factory band. Some of these were quite notable and long lived. The Orono Cornet Band pictured below was typical of the early bands and it carried on into the 1970s under different names. Most of the brass bands that formed in the 1840s and 50s added woodwind instruments by the 1890s. In the latter half of the 19th century, these bands provided the main entertainment for public events, fairs, parades and dances and provided the music that reached everyone in Canada. The Orono Cornet Band was a regular at the Orono Fair.

Update to 2011

A new musical revolution is underway brought to you by the Seniors of North America: The New Horizons Community Band

This movement was started by Roy Ernst, a professor at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester New York. The program is aimed at fulfilling the passion for music of many retired men and women who did not have time to pursue this interest while they were working. The New Horizons movement has been so successful that it has spread all over North America and has over 170 member bands. The bands are linked on line and many of the member musicians connect when they travel. It also offers music workshops so its members can learn from some of the finest band leaders in North America.

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
