1949 - Sissy Spacek, Actress Shirley emigrated to Canada from England in December of 1967 to take a job in Rockwood, Ont. working with horses. Working for 10 years in England with Show Jumpers, Hunters and Event horses, moved to Canada on the persuasion of friends who also emigrated.

Six months later she moved to Gormley, worked and travelled in the States and Canada with the Canadian Show Jumping team for a while, before going to Vancouver to visit her friends. Two months later was offered a job in Buffalo, New York, but came back preferring to be in Canada, and back to Gormley, again with Show jumpers.

In 1972, having shoveled enough horse manure..... (although she still had a horse of her own), moved to Guelph, took a 2 year Business course at Conestoga College, and on graduating, spent 2 years as Secretary at a local business, then moved to Toronto where she spent the next 24 years with an insurance company in investments, building management and purchasing.

In 1999 she took early retirement, bought a house in Wilmot Creek, and still resides there. Never having the time before, she wanted to do three things on retiring.... painting, stained glass, and learn how to play an instrument well, (still in progress)!

Current hobbies are; Computer Graphics, crossstitch, and any crafts you can mention.

She took up the Clarinet after meeting Judith Maxwell, who started a small beginners band called "The Dreamers", in Wilmot Creek, which later "morphed" into the original New Horizons Band. Able to play fairly proficiently, joined the Mood Swing Band in Whitby, The Moonlighters and Bent But Not Broken in Wilmot Creek, also going out and entertaining at Senior Residences solo and with Carole and Murray Milne's Wilmot Road Show. During this time Shirley added soprano and alto sax, flute, and an instrument called a Q-Chord to her repertoire. She left the bands for about 1 year, and rejoined 1-1/2 years ago.

Active in Community Theatre since coming to Canada, Shirley was involved with groups in Guelph, Scarborough, Oshawa and Whitby, and spent time in Dinner Theatre at Sisters in Toronto, and Class Act in Whitby, involved in Stage Managing, Producing, Lights, Sound, and the odd acting role. Retiring from Theatre 4 years ago, now leads a quiet life..., where the only excitement she has is practicing and playing in the Monday and Wednesday bands!!
